Our hiking trails here at the Forks of Coal State Natural Area offer visitors so much to see. That's why Carrie, our VISTA staffer, has been busy creating self-guided hiking brochures to help identify things you may otherwise never notice.

The items on the brochures are organized by numbers and will correspond to a number along the designated trail. Each item in the brochure is followed by a brief description of what you are looking at. The Blue to Green Trail brochure will focus on tree identification.

The Yellow Trail brochure will focus on a variety of things such as the Big Coal River, tree abnormalities, habitats, and more. Wildflower brochures have also been created to help visitors to the pollinator field identify flowers that are commonly in bloom during certain times of the year.

SCHOOL VISITS, NEW EXHIBITS

We have had a busy fall so far here at the Claudia L. Workman Wildlife Education Center. We have had many school visits that allow us to create a fun but educational experience for students of all ages. During these trips, kids can do a scavenger hunt in the center, a class of the teacher's choice, and guided hikes. This is a great opportunity for kids to learn more about West Virginia's beautiful nature and for them to experience it themselves. We are always scheduling field trips year-round, and we encourage teachers near and far to reach out to us. We have also been busy adding new exhibits to our education center.

Our new additions include a White-breasted Nuthatch, Five-lined skink on a mushroom, a Copperhead, Pileated Woodpecker,

Belted Kingfisher, Barred Owl, a squirrel and a pair of Mallard ducks. All these species are commonly found throughout West Virginia.

A couple of awards have also been displayed to showcase the hard work that goes into the center and surrounding area. We encourage everyone to stop in to see these latest additions.

WATER FESTIVAL AT FORKS OF COAL

On September 21, 2023, the West Virginia Department of Environmental Protection worked in conjunction with the Claudia L. Workman Wildlife Education Center to host the annual **Project WET Water Festival**. This event brought in approximately 175 fifth-grade students and their teachers from surrounding schools. Students transitioned from different stations that were set up to learn about the water cycle, wetlands, pollution, acid rain, aquatic benthic macroinvertebrates, and more. This was a great opportunity for students to learn about the abundance of our water resources and encouraging positive change for future generations.

WATER SCIENCE:

PROJECT WET: GREAT FOR TEACHERS AND STUDENTS

The WVDEP has a program that makes learning about water fun for students. It's called Project WET, a water science/education program for preK-12 educators – public, homeschool, private school teachers, youth club leaders and many others. The Project WET curriculum was developed through collaboration with teachers, scientists and resource professionals. It correlates with state and national standards and supports STEM principles.

Water Festivals are held as part of the programs. These are 1-day events for fifth grade students, designed to increase children's awareness about our natural resources and how we can protect those resources. The festivals are held all around the world to educate students in fun, interactive environments with hands-on activities. The activities complement existing curricula.

Topics include:

- The water cycle
- Groundwater
- Water quality
- Stream ecology
- Molecular properties
- Wetland functions
- Water management
- Water conservation
- · Water properties of soils
- Non-point source pollution/stormwater
